Eileen thank everyone for the generous paper products that were donated for the pantry. In addition \$25 cash was donated. St. Vincent de Paul Society will be the recipient of the goods and money since they are able to buy additional paper goods. The food pantry network is unable to that. Next month we are collecting food for the animal shelter.

<u>Membership:</u> Mary Ellinger shared that we currently have 211 paid members; another dozen or so former members have not renewed.

Scholarship: \$534 has been sent in with dues towards our scholarship fund. In June we will be giving out the Fran Alspach Award, this year to a Lakewood student. The S. Stauch Award will hand out two \$1,000 Scholarships a year for 5 years, beginning next year.

Birthdays: March / April Birthdays were recognized.


<u>Courtesy:</u> Please add names of any members needing get-well card or uplifting in any way.

Community Service Awards Presented at Spring Conference.

ORTA chapters were recognized for the outstanding job in the area of volunteer service during the Spring Conference on April 23. Carole Wolfe, the 2014 State chairman of the Community Services Committee and Jo Ann Ingram, this year's chairman presented awards to the top 12 chapters that had the most average volunteer hours per chapter member. They also recognized the four chapters that accumulated the most volunteer hours.

Carole prefaced the presentations with these remarks. "86% of our chapters submitted chapter reports showing volunteer hours performed by their members. The total hours is an astounding, 486,690. We also asked our ORTA members who live in other parts of the United States to submit their volunteer hours. Many did - to the tune of 37,196 hours. These two figures added together is almost five hundred and twenty five thousand hours of service given to others.

"This display of selflessness by ORTA members and our local chapters represents - in a dollar amount - Eleven million, eight hundred thirteen thousand, six hundred twenty nine dollars and thirty cents. It also represents, to a great extent tax dollars that would have to be spent and services that would need to be performed by local and state authorities.

"So... Thank you all. Please carry back to your chapter members the state community service committees gratitude. You certainly make us very proud." The 12 chapters with the highest <u>AVERAGE</u> volunteer hours per member for 2014 were:

Meigs Co. RTA - average hours per member - 74.62 Brown Co. RTA - average hours per member - 79.86 Guernsey Co. RTA - average hours per member - 80.75 Fayette Co. RTA - average hours per member - 85.71 Hardin Co. RTA - average hours per member - 90.06 Knox Co. RTA - average hours per member - 93.15

Madison Co. RTA - average hours per member - 97.00 Licking Co. RTA - average hours per member - 117.15

Williams Co. RTA - average hours per member - 124.61 Noble Co. RTA - average hours per member - 125.56 Seneca Co. RTA - average hours per member - 126.42 Perry Co. RTA - average hours per member - 131.62

The top four chapters who performed the <u>MOST</u> volunteer hours in 2014:

Summit Co. RTA performed 19,000 volunteer hours.

Clark Co. RTA performed 21,177 volunteer hours

Licking Co. RTA performed 26,242 volunteer hours

Trumbull Co, RTA performed 29,020 volunteer hours.

SOURCE OF SENIOR MOMENTS DISCOVERED!


